Some Trees To Grow On E. Post Rd.

More tree planting in White Plains has been scheduled by the White Plains Beautification Foundation, Inc.

This fall, the foundation hopes to plant 26 trees along E. Post Road, from Waller Avenue to S. Broadway on the south side and from Waller Avenue to Mitchell Place on the north side.

According to Brian Wallach, chairman of the foundation, the 26 pin oaks will cost an estimated \$4,000.

Chairman of the project is Ralph Holmes, a White Plains resident long active in civic affairs who is associated with

the Empire State Federal Savings and Loan Association, 188 E. Post Road.

The beautification of Mamaroneck Avenue led to the decision to continue the project along E. Post Road, Mr. Holmes said.

Owners of the property on E. Post Road will be solicited by Mr. Holmes — a "one-time only solicitation," he emphasized.

Once the trees are planted, the city will take over maintenance and replacement.

The tree planting on Post Road could not be extended from Waller to Mamaroneck

Avenue, George Mullen of the department of public works said, because of the narrowness of the sidewalk between those avenues.

The White Plains Beautification Foundation, Inc. is dedicated to the general improvement of the city of White Plains by the use of private money and in coordination with the best thinking and planning of city officials, Mr. Wallach said.

The foundation recently was granted federal tax exemption and all gifts are tax deductible.
